- 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u>
  - 2.1.1 <u>Scope</u>
    - (A) The Telephone Company does not undertake to transmit messages under this tariff.
    - (B) The Telephone Company shall be responsible only for the installation, operation and maintenance of the services which it provides.
    - (C) The Telephone Company will, for maintenance purposes, test its services only to the extent necessary to detect and/or clear troubles.
    - (D) Services are provided 24 hours daily, seven days per week, except as set forth in other applicable sections of this tariff.
    - (E) The Telephone Company does not warrant that its facilities and services meet standards other than those set forth in this tariff.

#### 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)

- 2.1.2 Limitations
  - (A) The Customer may not assign or transfer the use of services provided under this tariff; however, where there is not interruption of use or relocation of the services, such assignment or transfer may be made to:
    - (1) another Customer, whether an individual, partnership, association or corporation, provided the assignee or transferee assumes all outstanding indebtedness for such services, and the unexpired portion of the minimum period and the termination liability applicable to such services, if any; or
    - (2) a court-appointed receiver, trustee or other person acting pursuant to law in bankruptcy, receivership, reorganization, insolvency, liquidation or other similar proceedings, provided the assignee or transferee assumes the unexpired portion of the minimum period and the termination liability applicable to such services, if any.

In all cases of assignment or transfer, the written acknowledgment of the Telephone Company is required prior to such assignment or transfer which, after such acknowledgment shall be made within 15 days from the receipt of notification. All regulations and conditions contained in this tariff shall apply to such assignee or transferee.

The assignment or transfer of services does not relieve or discharge the assignor or transferor from remaining jointly or severally liable with the assignee or transferee for any obligations existing at the time of the assignment or transfer.

(B) The installation, use and restoration of services shall be in accordance with Part 64, Subpart D, Appendix A, of the Federal Communications Commission's Rules and Regulations, and shall be subject to the regulations set forth in Section 13.3.2(b), Telecommunications Service Priority (TSP) System.

### 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)

- 2.1.2 Limitations (Cont'd)
  - (C) Subject to compliance with the rules mentioned in (B) preceding, where a shortage of facilities or equipment exists at any time, either for temporary or protracted periods, the services offered herein will be provided to customers on a first-come first served basis. First-come first-served shall be based upon the received time and date stamped by the Telephone Company on complete and accurate customer orders which allow the Telephone Company to initiate its ordering process. Inaccurate or incomplete customer orders shall not be deemed to have been received until such time as the customer corrects such inaccuracies and/or omissions. The customer shall not be penalized for any delay in the Telephone Company review process beyond 24 hours of receipt. Once having been advised of the errors and/or omissions any delay in correction on the part of the customer shall be added to the received time.
- 2.1.3 Liability
  - (A) The Telephone Company's liability, if any, for its willful misconduct is not limited by this tariff. With respect to any other claim or suit, by a Customer or by any others, for damages associated with the preemption, installation, provision, termination, maintenance, repair or restoration of service, and subject to the provisions of (B) through (H) following, the Telephone Company's liability, if any, shall not exceed an amount equal to the proportionate charge for the service for the period during which the service was affected. This liability for damages shall be in addition to any amounts that may otherwise be due to the Customer under this tariff as a Credit Allowance for a Service Interruption.
  - (B) The Telephone Company shall not be liable for any act or omission of any other carrier or Customer providing a portion of a service, nor shall the Telephone Company for its own act or omission hold liable any other carrier or Customer providing a portion of a service.

  - 2.1.3 Liability (Cont'd)
    - (C) The Telephone Company is not liable for damages to the Customer premises resulting from the furnishing of a service, including the installation and removal of equipment and associated wiring, unless the damage is caused by the Telephone Company's negligence.
    - (D) The Telephone Company shall be indemnified, defended and held harmless by the Customer against any claims, loss or damage arising from the use of services offered under this tariff, involving;
      - (1) Claims for libel, slander, invasion of privacy, or infringement of copyright arising from the Customer's own communications;
      - (2) Claims for patent infringement arising from the End User's, IC's, Local Carrier Customer's or Other Network Provider's acts combining or using the service furnished by the Telephone Company in connection with facilities or equipment furnished by the End User, IC, Local Carrier Customer or Other Network Provider or;
      - (3) All other claims arising out of any act or omission of the Customer in the course of using services provided pursuant to this tariff.

- 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)
  - 2.1.3 Liability (Cont'd)
    - (E) The Telephone Company does not guarantee or make any warranty with respect to its services when used in an explosive atmosphere. The Telephone Company shall be indemnified, defended and held harmless by the Customer from any and all claims by any person relating to such customer's use of services so provided.
    - (F) No license under patents (other than the limited license to use) is granted by the Telephone Company or shall be implied or arise by estoppel, with respect to any service offered under this tariff. The Telephone Company will defend the Customer against claims of patent infringement arising solely from the use by the Customer of services offered under this tariff and will indemnify such Customer for any damages awarded based solely on such claims.
    - (G) Where an Exchange Telephone Company, Local Carrier Customer or Other Network Provider that jointly provides access service with the Telephone Company is incapable of denying such service in compliance with its tariff without the cooperation of the Telephone Company, the Telephone Company will assist that Exchange Telephone Company, Local Carrier Customer or Other Network Provider in denying joint access service to the customer as long as that Company indemnifies, defends and holds harmless the Telephone Company from and against any and all liability, loss, damages, costs, claims or expenses of any kind arising out of the Telephone Company's assistance in the denial of service.

#### 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)

- 2.1.3 Liability (Cont'd)
  - (H) The Telephone Company's failure to provide or maintain services under this tariff shall be excused by labor difficulties, governmental orders, civil commotions, criminal actions taken against the Telephone Company, acts of God and other circumstances beyond the Telephone Company's reasonable control, subject to the Credit Allowance for a Service Interruption as set forth in 2.4.4 following.

#### 2.1.4 Provision of Services

The Telephone Company, to the extent that such services are or can be made available with reasonable effort, and after provision has been made for the Telephone Company's telephone exchange services, will provide to the Customer upon reasonable notice services offered in other applicable sections of this tariff at rates and charges specified therein.

#### 2.1.5 Installation and Termination of Services

The services provided under this tariff (A) will include any entrance cable or drop wiring and wire or intrabuilding cable to that point where provision is made for termination of the Telephone Company's outside distribution network facilities at a suitable location inside a Customer-designated premises and (B) will be installed by the Telephone Company to such Point of Termination. Wire, required within a building to extend Access Service facilities, will be provided, at the Customer's request, on a time sensitive charge basis.

#### 2.1.6 <u>Maintenance of Services</u>

The services provided under this tariff shall be maintained by the Telephone Company. The Customer or others may not rearrange, move, disconnect, remove or attempt to repair any facilities provided by the Telephone Company, other than by connection or disconnection to any interface used, except with the written consent of the Telephone Company.

#### 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)

#### 2.1.7 Changes and Substitutions

Except as provided for equipment and systems subject to FCC Part 68 regulations at 47 C.F.R. S68.110(b), the Telephone Company may, where such action is reasonably required in the operation of its business, (A) substitute, change or rearrange any facilities used in providing service under this tariff, including but not limited to, (1) substitution of different metallic facilities, (2) substitution of carrier or derived facilities for metallic facilities used to provide other than metallic facilities and (3) substitution of metallic facilities for carrier or derived facilities used to provide other than metallic facilities, (B) change minimum protection criteria, (C) change operating or maintenance characteristics of facilities or (D) change operations or procedures of the Telephone Company. In case of any such substitution, change or rearrangement, the transmission parameters will be within the range as set forth in Sections 6 and 7 following. The Telephone Company shall not be responsible if any such substitution, change or rearrangement renders any Customer furnished services obsolete or requires modification or alteration thereof or otherwise affects their use or performance. If such substitution, change or rearrangement materially affects the operating characteristics of the facility, the Telephone Company will provide reasonable notification to the customer in writing. Reasonable time will be allowed for any redesign and implementation required by the change in operating characteristics. The Telephone Company will work cooperatively with the customer to determine reasonable notification procedures.

### 2.1.8 Discontinuance and Refusal of Services

(A) Unless the provisions of 2.2.1(B) following apply, if the Customer fails to comply with 2.1.6 preceding or 2.2.2, 2.3.1, 2.3.6, 2.3.7 or 2.4 following, including any payments to be made by it on the dates or at the times herein specified, the Telephone Company may, on thirty (30) days written notice by Certified U.S. Mail to the person designated by the Customer to receive such notices of noncompliance, refuse additional applications for service and/or refuse to complete any pending orders for service for the noncomplying customer at any time thereafter.

If the Telephone Company does not refuse additional applications for service on the date specified in the thirty (30) days notice, and the Customer's noncompliance continues, nothing contained herein shall preclude the Telephone Company's right to refuse additional applications for service to the noncomplying customer without further notice.

(B) Unless the provisions of 2.2.1(B) following apply, if a Customer fails to comply with 2.1.6 preceding or 2.2.2, 2.3.1, 2.3.6, 2.3.7 or 2.4 following, including any payments to be made by it on the dates and times herein specified, the Telephone Company may, on thirty (30) days written notice by Certified U.S. Mail to the person designated by that Customer to receive such notices of noncompliance, discontinue the provision of the services to the non-complying customer involved at any time thereafter. In the case of such discontinuance, all applicable charges, including termination charges, shall become due. If the Telephone Company does not discontinue the provision of the services involved on the date specified in the thirty (30) days notice, and the Customer's noncompliance continues, nothing contained herein shall preclude the Telephone Company's right to discontinue the provision of the services to the non-complying customer without further notice.

#### 2.1 <u>Undertaking of the Telephone Company</u> (Cont'd)

2.1.9 Limitation of Use of Metallic Facilities

Signals applied to a metallic facility shall conform to the limitations set forth in Technical Reference Publication AS No. 1. In the case of application of dc telegraph signaling systems, the Customer shall be responsible, at its expense, for the provision of current limiting devices to protect the Telephone Company facilities from excessive current due to abnormal conditions and for the provision of noise mitigation networks when required to reduce excessive noise.

#### 2.1.10 Notification of Service-Affecting Activities

The Telephone Company will provide the Customer reasonable notification of service-affecting activities that may occur in normal operation of its business. Such activities may include, but are not limited to, equipment or facilities additions, removals or rearrangements, routine preventative maintenance and major switching machine change-out. Generally, such activities are not individual Customer service specific, they affect many Customer services. No specific advance notification period is applicable to all service activities. The Telephone Company will work cooperatively with the Customer to determine the modification requirements.

#### 2.1.11 Coordination with Respect to Network Contingencies

The Telephone Company intends to work cooperatively with the Customer to develop network contingency plans in order to maintain maximum network capability following natural or man-made disasters which affect telecommunications services.

## 2.1.12 <u>Provision and Ownership of Telephone Numbers</u>

The Telephone Company reserves the reasonable right to assign, designate or change telephone numbers, any other call number designations associated with Access Services, or the Telephone Company serving central office prefixes associated with such numbers, when necessary in the conduct of its business, consistent with the rights of Other Network Providers to assign, designate or change telephone numbers. Should it become necessary to make a change in such number(s), the Telephone Company will furnish to the Customer 6 month's notice, by certified U.S. Mail, of the effective date and an explanation of the reason(s) for such change(s).

  - 2.2 <u>Use</u>
    - 2.2.1 Interference or Impairment
      - (A) The characteristics and methods of operation of any circuits, facilities or equipment provided by other than the Telephone Company and associated with the facilities utilized to provide services under this tariff shall not interfere with or impair service over any facilities of the Telephone Company, its affiliated companies, or its connecting and concurring carriers involved in its services, cause damage to their plant, impair the privacy of any communications carried over their facilities or create hazards to the employees of any of them or the public, or tend to injuriously affect the efficiency of the Telephone Company's personnel, plant, property or service.

- 2.2 <u>Use</u> (Cont'd)
  - 2.2.1 Interference or Impairment (Con't)
    - (B) Except as provided for equipment or systems subject to the FCC Part 68 rules in 47 C.F.R. S68.108, if such characteristics or methods of operation are not in accordance with (A) preceding, the Telephone Company will, where practicable, notify the Customer that temporary discontinuance of the use of a service may be required; however, where prior notice is not practicable, nothing contained herein shall be deemed to preclude the Telephone Company's right to temporarily discontinue forthwith the use of a service if such action is reasonable under the circumstances. In case of such temporary discontinuance, the Customer will be promptly notified and afforded the opportunity to correct the condition which gave rise to the temporary discontinuance. During such period of temporary discontinuance, credit allowance for service interruptions as set forth in 2.4.4 following is not applicable.
  - 2.2.2 Unlawful Use
    - (A) The service provided under this tariff shall not be used for an unlawful purpose.
    - (B) The Telephone Company shall, upon written request from a customer, terminate service to any subscriber of a customer identified by that customer as having utilized that customer's service and/or facilities in the completion of abusive telephone calls.
    - (C) In such instances when termination occurs, as in (B) preceding, the Telephone Company shall be indemnified, defended and held harmless by the customer against any claim, loss or damage arising from the Telephone Company actions in terminating such service.

- 2.3 Obligations of the Customer
  - 2.3.1 Damages

The Customer shall reimburse the Telephone Company for damages to Telephone Company facilities utilized to provide services under this tariff caused by the negligence or willful act of the Customer, or resulting from improper use of the Telephone Company facilities, or due to malfunction of any facilities or equipment provided by other than the Telephone Company. Nothing in the foregoing provision shall be interpreted to hold one customer liable for another customer's actions. The Telephone Company will, upon reimbursement for damages, cooperate with the Customer in prosecuting a claim against the person causing such damage and the Customer shall be subrogated to the right of recovery by the Telephone Company for the damages to the extent of such payment.

#### 2.3.2 Ownership of Facilities

Facilities utilized by the Telephone Company to provide service under the provisions of this tariff shall remain the property of the Telephone Company. Such facilities shall be returned to the Telephone Company by the Customer, whenever requested, within a reasonable period following the request in as good condition as reasonable wear will permit.

### 2.3.3 Equipment Space and Power

The Customer shall furnish or arrange to have furnished to the Telephone Company, at no charge, equipment space and electrical power required by the Telephone Company to provide services under this tariff at the points of termination of such services. The selection of ac or dc power shall be mutually agreed to by the Customer and the Telephone Company. The Customer shall also make necessary arrangements in order that the Telephone Company will have access to such spaces at reasonable times for installing, testing, repairing or removing Telephone Company services.

When the customer obtains Expanded Interconnection service as described in Section 15 of this tariff, the space and power requirements of this section shall be considered fulfilled.

#### 2.3 Obligations of the Customer (Cont'd)

#### 2.3.4 Availability for Testing

The services provided under this tariff shall be available to the Telephone Company at times mutually agreed upon in order to permit the Telephone Company to make tests and adjustments appropriate for maintaining the services in satisfactory operating condition. Such tests and adjustments shall be completed within a reasonable time. No credit will be allowed for any interruption during such tests and adjustments.

#### 2.3.5 Balance

All signals for transmission over the services provided under this tariff shall be delivered by the Customer balanced to ground except for ground start, duplex (DX) and McCulloh-Loop (Alarm System) type signaling and dc telegraph transmission at speeds of 75 baud or less.

- 2.3 <u>Obligations of the Customer</u> (Cont'd)
  - 2.3.6 Design of Customer Services

Subject to the provisions of 2.1.7 preceding, the Customer shall be responsible at its own expense for the overall design of its services and for any redesigning or rearrangement of its services which may be required because of changes in facilities, operations or procedures of the Telephone Company, minimum protection criteria or operating or maintenance characteristics of the facilities.

#### 2.3.7 <u>References to the Telephone Company</u>

The Customer may advise End Users that certain services are provided by the Telephone Company in connection with the service the Customer furnishes to End Users; however, the Customer shall not represent that the Telephone Company jointly participates in the Customer's services.

#### 2.3.8 Claims and Demands for Damages

- (A) With respect to claims of patent infringement made by third persons, the Customer shall defend, indemnify, protect and save harmless the Telephone Company from and against all claims arising out of the combining with, or use in connection with, the services provided under this tariff, any circuit, apparatus, system or method provided by the Customer.
- (B) The Customer shall defend, indemnify and save harmless the Telephone Company from and against suits, claims, and demands by third persons arising out of the construction, installation, operation, maintenance, or removal of the Customer's circuits, facilities, or

equipment connected to the Telephone Company's services provided under this tariff, including, without limitation, Workmen's Compensation claims, actions for infringement of copyright and/or unauthorized use of program material, libel and slander actions based on the content of communications transmitted over the Customer's circuits, facilities or equipment, and proceedings to recover taxes, fines, or penalties for failure of the Customer to obtain or maintain in effect any necessary certificates, permits, licenses, or other authority to acquire or operate the services provided under this tariff; provided, however, the foregoing indemnification shall not apply unless such suits, claims, and demands are based on the tortuous conduct of the Customer, its officers, agents or employees.

(C) The Customer shall defend, indemnify and save harmless the Telephone Company from and against any suits, claims, losses or damages, including punitive damages, attorney fees and court costs by the Customer or third parties arising out of any act or omission of the Customer in the course of using services provided under this tariff.

- 2.3 <u>Obligations of the Customer</u> (Cont'd)
  - 2.3.9 <u>Coordination with respect to Network Contingencies</u>

The Customer shall, in cooperation with the Telephone Company, coordinate in planning the actions to be taken to maintain maximum network capability following natural or man-made disasters which affect telecommunications services.

### 2.3.10 Jurisdictional Report Requirements

(A) <u>Jurisdictional Reports</u>

For Switched Access Service, the Telephone Company cannot in all cases determine the jurisdictional nature of customer traffic and its related access minutes. In such cases the customer may be called upon to provide a projected estimate of its traffic, split between the interstate and intrastate jurisdictions. The following regulations govern such estimates, their reporting by the customer and cases where the Telephone Company will develop jurisdictional percentages.

(1) <u>General</u>

Except where Telephone Company measured access minutes are used as set forth following, the customer shall report the percentage of interstate use as set forth in (2) and (3) following and such report will be used for billing purposes until the customer reports a different projected interstate percentage for an in-service end office group. When the customer adds BHMC, lines or trunks to an existing end office group, the customer shall furnish a revised projected interstate percentage that applies to the total BHMC, lines or trunks.

- 2.3 Obligations of the Customer (Cont'd)
  - 2.3.10 Jurisdictional Report Requirements (Cont'd)
    - (A) <u>Jurisdictional Reports</u> (Cont'd)
      - (1) <u>General</u> (Cont'd)

When the customer discontinues BHMC, lines or trunks from an existing group, the customer shall furnish a revised projected interstate percentage for the remaining BHMC, lines or trunks in the end office group. The revised report will serve as the basis for future billing and will be effective on the next bill date. No prorating or back billing will be done based on the report.

Effective on the first of January, April, July and October of each year, the customer shall update the interstate and intrastate jurisdictional report. The customer shall forward to the Telephone Company, to be received no later than fifteen (15) days after the first of each such month, a revised report showing the interstate and intrastate percentage of use for the past three months ending the last day of December, March, June and September, respectively, for each service arranged for interstate use.

Except where the Telephone Company is billing according to actuals by jurisdiction, the revised report will serve as the basis for the next three months billing and will be effective on the bill date for that service. No prorating or back billing will be done based on the report.

    - (A) Jurisdictional Reports (Cont'd)
      - (1) <u>General</u> (Cont'd)

If the customer does not supply the reports, the Telephone Company will assume the percentages to be the same as those provided in the last quarterly report. For those cases in which a quarterly report has never been received from the customer, the Telephone Company will assume the percentages to be the same as those provided in the order for service as set forth in (2) and (3) following.

- (2) Feature Groups A and B
  - (a) Pursuant to Federal Communications Commission Order FCC 85-145 released April 16, 1985, interstate usage is to be developed as though every call that enters a customer network at a point within the same state as that in which the called station (as designated by the called station telephone number) is situated is an intrastate communications and every call for which the point of entry is a state other than that where the called station (as designated by the called station telephone number) is situated is an interstate communication.
  - (b) When a customer orders Feature Group A or Feature Group B Switched Access Service the customer shall, in its order, state the projected interstate percentage for interstate usage for each Feature Group A or Feature Group B Switched Access Service group ordered. The term group shall be construed to mean single lines or trunks as well. If the customer discontinues some but not all of the Feature Group A or Feature Group B Switched Access Services in a group, it shall provide the projected interstate percentage for such services which are remaining.

      - (2) Feature Groups A and B (Cont'd)
        - (c) For multiline hunt group or trunk group arrangements where either the interstate or the intrastate charges are based on measured usage, the interstate Feature Group A or Feature Group B Switched Access Service(s) information reported as set forth in (a) and (b) preceding will be used to determine the charges.

For all groups the number of access minutes (either measured or assumed) for a group will be multiplied by the projected interstate percentage to develop the interstate access minutes. The number of access minutes for the group minus the developed interstate access minutes for the group will be the developed intrastate access minutes.

(3) Feature Groups C and D

When a customer orders Feature Group C or Feature Group D Switched Access Service(s) the customer may provide the projected interstate usage for each end office in its order. Alternatively the Telephone Company, where the jurisdiction can be determined from the call detail, will determine the projected interstate percentage as follows:

For originating access minutes, the actual interstate percentage will be developed on a monthly basis by end office where the Feature Group C or Feature Group D Switched Access Service access minutes are measured by dividing the measured interstate originating access minutes (the access minutes where the calling number is one state and the called number is another state) by the total originating access minutes, when the call detail is adequate to determine the appropriate jurisdiction.

For terminating access minutes, the Customer will provide the Telephone Company with the appropriate interstate percentage.

When originating call details are insufficient to determine the jurisdiction for the call, the customer shall supply the projected interstate percentage. The projected intrastate percentage of use will be obtained by subtracting the projected interstate percentage for originating and terminating minutes from 100 (intrastate percentage = 100 - interstate percentage).

### (B) Jurisdictional Reports Verification

When a customer provides a projected interstate usage percent as set forth in (A) preceding, the Telephone Company may (on written request by U.S. mail) require the customer to provide call detail records which will be audited to substantiate the projected interstate usage factor provided to the Telephone Company. The Telephone Company may request this detailed information annually. If the audit results represent a substantial deviation from the customer's previously reported PIU for the period upon which the audit was based, the call detail records may be requested more than once annually. The Telephone Company will request that the call detail records be made available to an independent auditor or the Telephone Company within thirty (30) days of the request at an agreed upon location during normal business hours.

When mixed interstate and intrastate Access Service is provided, all usage charges will be prorated between interstate and intrastate. The percentage provided in the reports as set forth in 2.3.10(A) preceding will serve as the basis for prorating the charges. The percentage of an Access Service to be charged as intrastate is applied in the following manner: multiply the percent intrastate use times actual use (i.e., measured or Telephone Company assumed average use) times the stated tariff rate.

The intrastate percentage will change as revised usage reports are submitted as set forth in 2.3.10 preceding.

## 2.3.12 Identification and Rating of VoIP-PSTN Traffic\*

- (A) Scope
  - (1) VoIP-PSTN Traffic is defined as traffic exchanged between the Telephone Company end user and the customer in time division multiplexing ("TDM") format that originates and/or terminates in Internet protocol ("IP") format. This section governs the identification of VoIP-PSTN Traffic that is required to be compensated at interstate access rates by the Federal Communications Commission in its Report and Order in WC Docket Nos. 10-90, etc., FCC Release No. 11-161 (Nov. 18, 2011) ("FCC Order"). Specifically, this section establishes the method of separating such traffic (referred to in this tariff as "Relevant VoIP-PSTN Traffic") from the customer's traditional intrastate access traffic, so that such Relevant VoIP-PSTN Traffic can be billed in accordance with the FCC Order.

\*On April 25, 2012 the FCC released its Second Order on Reconsideration of the USF/ICC Transformation Order. Based on this Order, the tariff language in this section will also apply to originating VoIP-PSTN access traffic for the period of December 29, 2011 through the effective date of the FCC's April 25th Order, which will occur 45 days after publication of the Order in the Federal Register. Under the Order, as of July 1, 2014 VOIP-PSTN Originating Traffic will be rated at interstate rates.

- (A) Scope (Cont'd)
  - (2) This section will be applied to the billing of switched access charges to a customer that is a local exchange carrier only to the extent that the customer has also implemented billing of interstate access charges for Relevant VoIP-PSTN Traffic in accordance with the FCC Order.
- (B) Rating of VoIP-PSTN Traffic

The Relevant VoIP-PSTN Traffic identified in accordance with this tariff section will be billed at rates equal to the Telephone Company's applicable tariffed interstate switched access rates as specified in the FCC Tariff.

(C) Calculation and Application of Percent-VoIP-Usage Factor

The Telephone Company will determine the number of Relevant VoIP-PSTN Traffic minutes of use ("MOU") to which interstate rates will be applied under subsection (B), above, by applying a Percent VoIP Usage ("PVU") factor to the total terminating\* intrastate access MOU received by The Telephone Company from the customer. The PVU will be derived and applied as follows:

(1) The customer will calculate and furnish to the Telephone Company a factor (the "PVU") representing the percentage of the total intrastate and interstate access MOU that the customer terminates to the Telephone Company in the State, that is sent to the Telephone Company and that originated in IP format. This PVU shall be based on information such as traffic studies, actual call detail, or other relevant and verifiable information.

\*The FCC is considering a request for clarification concerning whether or not interstate switched access rates apply to intrastate PSTN originating –VoIP terminating (as reported by the IXC) traffic for purposes of billing originating access. If the FCC determines that interstate rates apply to this traffic, carriers that have paid intrastate rates for this traffic will be credited for the lower interstate rates retroactive to the effective date of the FCC Order, December 29, 2011.

This retroactive adjustment will be made to January 1, 2012, provided that the customer provides the factor to the Telephone Company no later than April 15, 2012; otherwise, it will set the initial PVU equal to zero, as specified in subsection (C)(1), above.

(E) PVU Factor Updates

The customer may update the PVU factor quarterly using the method set forth in subsection (C)(1), above. If the customer chooses to submit such updates, it shall forward to the Telephone Company, no later than 15 days after the first day of January, April, July and/or October of each year, a revised PVU factor based on data for the prior three months, ending the last day of December, March, June and September, respectively. The revised PVU factor will apply prospectively and serve as the basis for billing until superseded by a new PVU.

(F) PVU Factor Verification

Not more than four times in any year, the Telephone Company may ask the customer to verify the PVU factor furnished to the Telephone Company. The party so requested shall comply, and shall reasonably provide the records and other information used to determine the PVU factors.

No such deposit will be required of a customer which is a successor of a company which has established credit and has no history of late payments to the Telephone Company. Such deposit may not exceed the actual or estimated rates and charges for the service for a two month period. The fact that a deposit has been made in no way relieves the Customer from complying with the Telephone Company's regulations as to the prompt payment of bills. At such time as the provision of the service to the Customer is terminated, the amount of the deposit will be credited to the Customer's account and any credit balance which may remain will be refunded. The deposit will be credited to the Customer's account when the Customer has established credit or, in any event, has established a one-year prompt record of payment at any time prior to the termination of the provision of service to the Customer. In case of a deposit of cash or negotiable instrument, for the period the deposit is held by the Telephone Company, the Customer will receive simple annual interest at the rate specified by the New York State Public Service Commission. Should a deposit be credited to the Customer's account, as indicated above, no interest will accrue on the deposit from the date such deposit is credited to the Customer's account.
    - (B) The Telephone Company shall bill on a current basis all charges incurred by and credits due to the Customer under this tariff attributable to services established, performed or discontinued during the preceding billing period.

In addition, the Telephone Company shall bill in advance charges for all services to be provided during the ensuing billing period except for charges associated with service usage and for the Federal Government which will be billed in arrears. Customers providing service to the Federal Government are not entitled to the benefits of the laws or regulations providing for billing in arrears, so they will be billed in advance for services as stated above.

At the option of the customer, all nonrecurring charges associated with a Standard or Negotiated Interval Access Order may be billed over a three month period in monthly installments subject to the following:

The minimum periods for which services are provided and for which rates and charges are applicable is three months except for those services set forth in 13.3.4 following.

The minimum period for which service is provided and for which rates and charges are applicable for a Specialized Service or Arrangement provided on an individual case basis as set forth in 12, following, is three months unless a different minimum period is established with the individual case filing.

When a service is discontinued prior to the expiration of the minimum period, charges are applicable whether the service is used or not, as follows:

- (A) When a service with a one month minimum period is discontinued prior to the expiration of the minimum period, a monthly charge will apply at the rate level in effect at the time service is discontinued.
- (B) When a service with a minimum period greater than one month is discontinued prior to the expiration of the minimum period, the applicable charge will be the lesser of (1) the Telephone Company's total nonrecoverable costs less the net salvage value for the discontinued service or (2) the total monthly charge, at the rate level in effect at the time service is discontinued, for the remainder of the minimum period.

If a Customer requests service and then cancels the order before the Telephone Company has completed it, the Customer shall pay the greater of any costs the Telephone Company has already incurred in connection with the order or the normal minimum charge plus installation and termination charges.

If a Customer requests a change to an order (such as a due date) after work has begun, the Customer shall pay a Service Order Charge plus any additional costs that have already been incurred in connection with the order.

#### 2.4.4 Credit Allowance for Service Interruptions

(A) <u>General</u>

A service is interrupted when it becomes unusable to the Customer because of a failure of a facility component used to furnish service under this tariff or in the event that the protective controls applied by the Telephone Company result in the complete loss of service by the customer as set forth in 6.5.1 following. An interruption period starts when an inoperative service is reported to the Telephone Company, and ends when the service is operative.

(B) <u>When Credit Allowance Applies</u>

In case of an interruption to any service, allowance for the period of interruption, if not due to the negligence of the Customer, shall be as follows:

(1) For Switched Access Service, no credit shall be allowed for an interruption of less than 24 hours. The customer shall be credited for an interruption of 24 hours or more at the rate of 1/30 of the assumed minutes of use charge, or for each period of 24 hours or major fraction (12 hours and 1 minute) thereof that the interruption continues. However, in the case of service billed based upon actual usage, no credit allowance will be given.

The period for which no credit allowance is made begins on the seventh day after the Customer receives the Telephone Company's written notification of the need for such replacement and ends on the day after receipt by the Telephone Company of the Customer's written authorization for such replacement.
- (6) Periods when the Customer elects not to release the service for testing and/or repair and continues to use it on an impaired basis.
- (7) Periods of temporary discontinuance as set forth in 2.2.1(B) and 2.2.2 preceding.
- (8) An interruption or a group of interruptions, resulting from a common cause, for amounts less than one dollar.

  - (D) <u>Use of an Alternative Service Provided by the Telephone Company</u>

Should the Customer elect to use an alternative service provided by the Telephone Company during the period that a service is interrupted, the Customer must pay the tariffed rates and charges for the alternative service used.

(E) <u>Temporary Surrender of a Service</u>

In certain instances, the Customer may be requested by the Telephone Company to surrender a service for purposes other than maintenance, testing or activity relating to a service order. If the Customer consents, a credit allowance will be granted. Customer consent for preemption is not required under conditions outlined in section 13.3.2, following. The credit allowance will be 1/1440 of the monthly rate for each period of 30 minutes or fraction thereof that the service is surrendered. In no case will the credit allowance exceed the monthly rate for the service surrendered in any one monthly billing period.

Charges do not apply for the re-establishment of service following a fire, flood or other occurrence attributed an Act of God provided that:

Nonrecurring Charges apply for establishing service at a different location on the same premises or at a different premises pending re-establishment of service at the original location.

(A) The payment of rates and charges by Customers for the services offered under the provisions of this tariff does not assign, confer or transfer title or ownership rights to proposals or facilities developed or utilized, respectively, by the Telephone Company in the provision of such services.

The Telephone Company may handle ordering, rating and billing of Access Services under this tariff where more than one Exchange Telephone Company or Other Network Provider is involved in the provision of Access Service, dependent on the interconnection arrangements between the Exchange Telephone Companies and other Network Providers involved.

- (A) <u>Meet Point Billing-Non FGA</u>
  - (1) Each Exchange Telephone Company will provide its portion of the Transport element to an interconnection point (IP) with the other Exchange Telephone Company or Other Network Provider. Each Exchange Telephone Company or Other Network Provider will determine the charges involved for its portion of the Access Service ordered and will bill such charges in accordance with its Access Service tariff. The rate for the Transport Element for Switched Access will be determined as set forth in (3) following. All other charges in each Exchange Telephone Company or Other Network Provider tariff are applicable.
  - (2) The Telephone Company will provide at least 30 days written notice to the customer prior to implementing any changes in the procedures for furnishing jointly provided access services.
  - (3) The rate for the local Transport for services provided as set forth in (1) and (2) preceding is determined as follows:
    - (a) Determine the appropriate Local Transport mileage by computing the airline mileage between the two ends of the local Transport element. Determine the airline mileage for the local Transport element using the V & H method as set forth in National Exchange Carrier Tariff FCC No. 4.
    - (b) Determine the rate for the airline mileage determined in

       Because the Telephone Company's Local Transport element is non-distance sensitive, the full Transport element charge applies.

Equipment and Systems (i.e., terminal equipment, multiline terminating systems and communications systems) may be connected with Switched Access Service furnished by the Telephone Company where such connection is made in accordance with the provisions specified in Technical Reference Publication AS No. 1 and in 2.1 preceding.

### 2.6 <u>Definitions</u>

Certain terms used herein are defined as follows:

### Access Code

The term "Access Code" denotes a uniform five or seven digit code assigned by the Telephone Company to an individual Customer. The five digit code has the form 10XXX, and the seven digit code has the form 950-0XXX or 950-1XXX.

### Access Minutes

The term "Access Minutes" denotes that usage of exchange facilities in intrastate service for the purpose of calculating chargeable usage. On the originating end of an intrastate call, usage is measured from the time the originating End User's call is delivered by the Telephone Company to and acknowledged as received by the customer's facilities connected with the originating exchange. On the terminating end of an intrastate call, usage is measured from the time the call is received by the End User in the terminating exchange. Timing of usage at both originating and terminating ends of an intrastate call shall terminate when the calling or called party disconnects, whichever event is recognized first in the originating and terminating end exchanges, as applicable.

### Access Tandem

The term "Access Tandem" denotes a Telephone Company switching system that provides a traffic concentration and distribution function for originating or terminating traffic between end offices and a Customer's premises.

## Actual Cost

The term "Actual Cost" denotes all costs charged against a specific case of special construction, including any appropriate taxes.

<u>Annual Under-Utilization Liability</u> - The term "Under-Utilization Liability" denotes a per unit amount which may be billed annually if fewer services are in use utilizing specially constructed facilities at filed tariff rates than were originally specially constructed.

### Answer/Disconnect Supervision

The term "Answer/Disconnect Supervision" denotes the transmission of the switch trunk equipment supervisory signal (off-hook or on-hook) to the Customer's point of termination as an indication that the called party has answered or disconnected.

## 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### Attenuation Distortion

The term "Attenuation Distortion" denotes the difference in loss at specified frequencies relative to the loss at 1004 Hz, unless otherwise specified.

## Balance (100 Type) Test Line

The term "Balance (100 Type) Test Line" denotes an arrangement in an end office which provides for balance and noise testing.

<u>Bit</u>

The term "Bit" denotes the smallest unit of information in the binary system of notation.

### Business Day

The term "Business Day" denotes the times of day that a company is open for business. Generally, in the business community, these are 8:00 or 9:00 AM to 5:00 or 6:00 PM, respectively, with an hour for lunch, Monday through Friday, resulting in a standard forty (40) hour work week. However, Business Day hours for the Telephone Company may vary based on company policy, union contract and location. To determine such hours for the Telephone Company, or a Telephone Company location, the Telephone Company should be contacted at the address shown below.

## Busy Hour Minutes of Capacity (BHMC)

The term "Busy Hour Minutes of Capacity (BHMC)" denotes the customer specified maximum amount of Switched Access Service access minutes the customer expects to be handled in an end office switch during any hour in an 8:00 AM to II:00 PM period for the Feature Group Service ordered. This customer furnished BHMC quantity is the input data the Telephone Company uses to determine the number of transmission paths for the Feature Group Service ordered.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

Call

The term "Call" denotes a Customer attempt for which the complete address code (e.g.,0-, 911, or 10 digits) is provided to the serving dial tone office.

### Carrier or Common Carrier

See Interexchange Carrier.

<u>CCS</u>

The term "CCS" denotes a hundred call seconds, which is a standard unit of traffic load that is equal to 100 seconds of usage or capacity of a group of servers (e.g., trunks).

### Central Office

The term "Central Office" denotes the Telephone Company switching system where customer links are terminated for purposes of interconnection to each other and to trunks.

## Central Office Prefix

The term "Central Office Prefix" denotes the first three digits (NXX) of the seven digit telephone number assigned to Customer ports when dialed on a local basis.

## Centralized Automatic Reporting on Trunks (CAROT) Testing

The term "Centralized Automatic Reporting on Trunks (CAROT) Testing" denotes a type of testing which includes the capacity for measuring operational and transmission parameters.

## 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### Channel(s)

The term "Channel(s)" denotes an electrical or photonic, in the case of fiber optic based transmission systems, communications path between two or more points of termination.

### Channel Service Unit

The term "Channel Service Unit" denotes equipment which performs one or more of the following functions: termination of a digital facility, regeneration of digital signals, detection and/or correction of signal format errors, remote loop back.

### Channelize

The term "Channelize" denotes the process of multiplexing- demultiplexing wider bandwidth or high speed channels into narrower band-width or lower speed channels.

### C-Message Noise

The term "C-Message Noise" denotes the frequency weighted average noise within an idle voice channel. The frequency weighting, called C-message, is used to simulate the frequency characteristic of the 500-type telephone set and the hearing of the average subscriber.

## C-Notched Noise

The term "C-Notched Noise" denotes the C-message frequency weighted noise on a voice channel with a holding tone, which is removed at the measuring end through a notch (very narrow band) filter.

### **Coin Station**

The term "Coin Station" denotes a location where equipment is provided in a public or semipublic place where customers can originate telephonic communications and pay the applicable charges by inserting coins into the equipment.

### Common Line

The term "Common Line" denotes a line, trunk, pay telephone line or other facility provided under the local exchange service tariffs of the Telephone Company, terminated on a central office switch. A common line-residence is a line or trunk provided under the residence regulations of the local exchange service tariffs. A common line-business is a line provided under the business regulations of the general and/or local exchange service tariffs.

### Communications System

The term "Communications System" denotes channels and other facilities which are capable of communications between terminal equipment provided by other than the Telephone Company.

### Connecting Company

An Exchange Telephone Company (as traditionally interpreted by the New York State Public Service Commission) whose network connects to the Telephone Company's network for the purpose of exchanging traffic. The traffic exchanged over the connection may be local, toll, or access in nature and may belong to the Connecting Company, the Telephone Company, or a third entity.

### Customer(s)

The term "Customer(s)" denotes any individual, partnership, association, corporation, joint-stock company, trust or governmental agency or any other entity which subscribes to the services offered under this tariff, including Interexchange Carriers (ICs), End Users, and Other Network Providers.

## 2.6 Definitions (Cont'd)

Customer Designated Premises

The term "Customer Designated Premises" denotes the premises specified by the customer for the termination of Access Services.

## Customer Message

The term "Customer Message" used herein for Feature Group A Switched Access Service denotes a completed call over an intrastate Feature Group A Switched Access Service. A completed call includes both completed calls originated to and terminated from a Feature Group A Switched Access Service. A customer message begins in the originating direction when the off-hook supervision provided by the premise of the ordering customer is received by Telephone Company recording equipment.

A customer message begins in the terminating direction when answer supervision is received by Telephone Company recording equipment indicating the called party has answered. A customer message ends in the originating direction when disconnect supervision is received by Telephone Company recording equipment from the premise of the ordering customer. A customer message ends in the terminating direction when disconnect supervision is received by Telephone Company recording equipment from the premise of the ordering customer. A customer message ends in the terminating direction when disconnect supervision is received by Telephone Company recording equipment from either the premise of the ordering customer or the called party.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

## Data Transmission (107 (Type) Test Line

The term "Data Transmission (107 Type) Test Line" denotes an arrangement which provides for a connection to a signal source which provides test signals for one-way testing of data and voice transmission parameters.

# Decibel (db)

The term "Decibel" denotes a unit used to express relative difference in power, usually between acoustic or electric signals, equal to ten (10) times the common logarithm or the ratio of two signal powers.

## Decibel Reference Noise C-Message Weighting

The term "Decibel Reference Noise C-Message Weighting" denotes noise power measurements with C-Message weighting in decibels relative to a reference 1000 Hz tone of 90 dB below 1 milliwatt.

## Decibel Reference Noise C-Message Referenced to 0

The term "Decibel Reference Noise C-Message Referenced to 0" denotes noise power in "Decibel Reference Noise C-Message Weighting" referred to or measured at a zero transmission level point.

### 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### **Detail Billing**

The term "Detail Billing" denotes the listing of each message and/or rate element for which charges to a Customer are due on a bill prepared by the Telephone Company.

#### Digital Access Cross-connect System

The term Digital Access Cross-connect System denotes a multiplexing system that provides a digital interface between a Telephone Company designated Hub wire center and a customer designated premises.

#### **Digital Data Service Secondary Channel**

The term "Digital Data Service Secondary Channel" denotes an option to DDS that allows the performance of network testing and management through a derived data channel at a substantially lower bit rate without network interruption.

### Directory Assistance (Intrastate)

The term "Directory Assistance" denotes the provision of telephone numbers by a Telephone Company operator when the operator location is accessed by a Customer premises by sending the appropriate signals, e.g., off-hook, 411.

### Directory Assistance Location (Intrastate)

The term "Directory Assistance Location" denotes a Telephone Company office where Telephone Company equipment first receives the Directory Assistance Call from a customer's premises and selects the first operator position to respond to the Directory Assistance Call.

### Dual Tone Multifrequency Address Signaling

The term "Dual Tone Multifrequency Address Signaling" denotes a type of signaling that is an optional feature of Switched Access Feature Group A. It may be utilized when Feature Group A is being used in the terminating direction (from the point of termination with the Customer to the local exchange end office). An office arranged for Dual Tone Multifrequency Signaling would expect to receive address signals from the Customer in the form of Dual Tone Multifrequency signals.

### Echo Control

The term "Echo Control" denotes the control of reflected signals in a telephone transmission patch.

# Echo Path Loss (EPL)

The term "Echo Path Loss" denotes the measure of reflected signal at a 4-wire point of interface without regard to the send and receive Transmission Level Point (TLP).

## Echo Return Loss (ERL)

The term "Echo Return Loss" denotes a frequency weighted measure of return loss over the middle of the voiceband (approximately 500 to 2500 Hz), where talker echo is most annoying.

#### Effective 2-Wire

The term "Effective 2-Wire" denotes a condition which permits the simultaneous transmission in both directions over a channel, but it is not possible to insure independent information transmission in both directions. Effective 2-wire channels may be terminated with 2-wire and 4-wire interfaces.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### Effective 4-Wire

The term "Effective 4-Wire" denotes a condition which permits the simultaneous independent transmission of information in both directions over a channel. The method of implementing effective 4-wire transmission is at the discretion of the Telephone Company (physical, time domain, frequency-domain separation or echo cancellation techniques). Effective 4-wire channels may be terminated with a 2-wire interface at the Customer's premises. However, when terminated 2-wire, simultaneous independent transmission cannot be supported because the two-wire interface combines the transmission paths into a single path.

### End Office Switch

The term "End Office Switch" denotes a local switching system where customer links are terminated for purposes of interconnection to each other and to trunks. Included are Remote Switching Modules (RSM) and Remote Switching Systems (RSS) served by a host office in a different wire center.

### End User

The term "End User" refers to any residential or business customer at whose premise telecommunications traffic is originated or terminated.

## Entry Switch

See First Point of Switching

### Envelope Delay Distortion (EDD)

The term "Envelope Delay Distortion" denotes a measure of the linearity of the phase versus frequency of a channel.

### Equal Level Echo Path Loss (ELEPL)

The term "Equal Level Echo Path Loss" denotes the measure of Echo Path Loss (EPL) at a 4-wire interface which is corrected by the difference between the send receive and receive Transmission Level Point (TLP).

[ELEPL - EPL = TLP (send) + TLP (receive)].

### Expected Measured Loss (EML)

The term "Expected Measured Loss" denotes a calculated loss which specifies the end-to-end 1004-Hz transducer loss on a terminated test connection between two readily accessible manual or remote test points. It is the sum of the inserted connection loss including any test pads.

### Exchange

The term "Exchange" denotes a unit generally smaller than a LATA (Local Access and Transport Area) established by the Telephone Company for the administration of communications service in a specified area which usually embraces a city, town or village and its environs. It consists of one or more central offices together with the associated facilities used in furnishing communications service within that area. One or more designated exchanges comprise a given LATA.

#### Facilities

The term "Facilities" denotes any cable, poles, conduit, microwave or carrier equipment, wire center distribution frames, central office switching equipment, etc., utilized to provide the services offered under this tariff.

### Field Identifier

The term "Field Identifier" denotes two to four characters that are used on service orders to convey specific instructions. Field Identifiers may or may not have associated data. Selected Field Identifiers are used in Telephone Company billing systems to generate nonrecurring charges.

### First Come - First Served

The term "First Come - First Served" denotes a procedure followed when a shortage of facilities or equipment occurs, such that an Access Service ordered cannot be installed. The orders delayed by the shortage of facilities will be prioritized according to the sequence in which they were received. That is, when facilities or equipment become available, the first order received will be the first order processed.

### First Point of Switching

The term "First Point of Switching" denotes the first location at which switching occurs on the terminating path of a call proceeding from the Customer premises to the terminating end office and, at the same time, the last Telephone Company location at which switching occurs on the originating path of a call proceeding from the originating end office to the Customer premises.

### Frequency Shift

The term "Frequency Shift" denotes the change in the frequency of a tone as it is transmitted over a channel.

### Grandfathered

The term "Grandfathered" denotes Terminal Equipment, Multiline Terminating Systems and Protective Circuitry directly connected to the facilities utilized to provide services under the provisions of this tariff, and which are considered grandfathered under Part 68 of the F.C.C.'s Rules and Regulations.

#### Host Office

The term "Host Office" denotes an electronic switching system which provides call processing capabilities for one or more Remote Switching Modules or Remote Switching Systems.

### Immediately Available Funds

The term "Immediately Available Funds" denotes a corporate or personal check drawn on a bank account and funds which are available for use by the receiving party on the same day on which they are received and include U.S. Federal Reserve bank wire transfers, U.S. Federal Reserve notes (paper cash), U.S. coins, U.S. Postal Money Orders and New York Certificates of Deposit.

#### Impedance Balance

The term "Impedance Balance" denotes the method of expressing Echo Return Loss and Singing Return Loss at a 4-wire interface whereby the gains and/or loss of the 4 wire portion of the transmission path, including the hybrid, are not included in the specification.

### Impulse Noise

The term "Impulse Noise" denotes any momentary occurrence of the noise on a channel over a specified level threshold. It is evaluated by counting the number of occurrences which exceed the threshold.

### Individual Case Basis (ICB)

The term "Individual Case Basis" denotes a condition in which the regulations, if applicable, rates and charges for an offering under the provisions of this tariff are developed based on the circumstances in each case.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### **Initial Liability Period**

The term "Initial Liability Period" denotes the initial planning period during which the customer expects to place specially constructed facilities in service.

### Inserted Connection Loss (ICL)

The term "Inserted Connection Loss" denotes the 1004 Hz power difference (in dB) between the maximum power available at the originating end and the actual power reaching the terminating end through the inserted connection.

### **Installed Cost**

The term "Installed Cost" denotes the total investment (estimated or actual) required by the Telephone Company to provide specially constructed facilities.

### Interexchange Carrier (IC) or Interexchange Common Carrier

The term "Interexchange Carrier" (IC) or "Interexchange Common Carrier" denotes any individual, partnership, association, joint-stock company, trust, governmental entity or corporation engaged for hire in intrastate communication by wire or radio, between two or more exchanges.

### Intermodulation Distortion

The term "Intermodulation Distortion" denotes a measure of the nonlinearity of a channel. It is measured using four tones, and evaluating the ratios (in dB) of the transmitted composite four-tone signal power to the second-order products of the tones (R2), and the third-order products of the tones (R3).

### Interstate Communications

The term "Interstate Communications" denotes both interstate and foreign communications.

#### Intrastate Communications

The term "Intrastate Communications" denotes any communications within a state subject to oversight by a state regulatory commission as provided by the laws of the state involved.

#### Legal Holiday

The term "Legal Holiday" denotes days other than Saturday or Sunday for which the Telephone Company is normally closed. These include New Year's Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas, and a day when Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day or Columbus day is legally observed and other locally observed holidays when the Telephone Company is closed.

### **Line-Side Connection**

The term "Line-Side Connection" denotes a connection of a transmission path to the line side of a local exchange switching system.

### Local Access and Transport Area (LATA)

The term "Local Access and Transport Area" denotes a geographic area established for the provision and administration of communications service. It encompasses designated exchanges, which are grouped to serve common social, economic and other purposes. For purposes of administering regulations and rates contained in this tariff, the term "Local Access and Transport Area" also denotes the Rochester Market Area.

### Local Carrier Customer (or Primary Local Carrier)

The term "Local Carrier Customer" or "Primary Local Carrier" refers to those entities that purchase some or all network services from ROCHESTER TELEPHONE CORP. under the Telephone Company's P.S.C. No. 1 tariff and provide service to End Users.

### Local Tandem Switch

The term "Local Tandem Switch" denotes a local Telephone Company operating unit by means of which local or access telephonic communications are switched to and from an End Office Switch.

### Loop Around Test Line

The term "Loop Around Test Line" denotes an arrangement utilizing a telephone company central office to provide a means to make certain two-way transmission tests on a manual basis. This arrangement has two central office terminations, each reached by means of separate telephone numbers and does not require any specific customer premises equipment. Equipment subject to this test arrangement is at the discretion of the customer.

### Loss Deviation

The term "Loss Deviation" denotes the variation of the actual loss from the designed value.

### Major Fraction Thereof

The term "Major Fraction Thereof" is any period of time in excess of 1/2 of the stated amount of time. As an example, in considering a period of 24 hours, a major fraction thereof would be any period of time in excess in 12 hours exactly. Therefore, if a given service is interrupted for a period of thirty-six hours and fifteen minutes, the customer would be given a credit allowance for two twenty-four hour periods for a total of forty-eight hours.

## Maximum Termination Liability

The term "Maximum Termination Liability" denotes the maximum amount which may be billed if all services using specially constructed facilities are terminated prior to the expiration of the Maximum Termination Liability Period.

## Maximum Termination Liability Period

The term "Maximum Termination Liability Period" denotes the length of time for which a termination charge may apply if all services using specially constructed facilities are terminated.

The term "Message" denotes a "call" as defined preceding.

### Milliwatt (102 Type) Test Line

The term "Milliwatt (102 Type) Test Line" denotes an arrangement in an end office which provides a 1004 Hz tone at 0 dBm0 for one-way transmission measurements towards the Customer's premises form the Telephone Company end office.

#### Modification of Final Judgement (MFJ)

The term "Modification of Final Judgement" (MFJ) denotes the consent decree approved by the U.S. District Court in <u>United States v. Western Electric and AT&T</u>, 552 F. Supp. 131 (D.D. C., 1982) and as subsequently modified.

### Net Salvage

The term "Net Salvage" denotes the estimated scrap, sale, or trade-in value, less the estimated cost of removal. Cost of removal includes the costs of demolishing, tearing down, or otherwise disposing of the material and any other applicable costs. Since the cost of removal may exceed salvage value, net salvage may be negative.

### Network Control Signaling

The term "Network Control Signaling" denotes the transmission of signals used in the telecommunications system which perform functions such as supervision (control, status, and charge signals), address signaling (e.g., dialing), calling and called number identifications, rate of flow, service selection error control and audible tone signals (call progress signals indicating re-order or busy conditions, alerting, coin denominations, coin collect and coin return tones) to control the operation of the telecommunications system.

### Nonrecoverable Cost

The term "Nonrecoverable Cost" denotes the cost of specially constructed facilities for which the Telephone Company has no foreseeable use should the service be terminated.

### Nonsynchronous Test Line

The term "Nonsynchronous Test Line" denotes an arrangement in step-by-step end offices which provides operational tests which are not as complete as those provided by the synchronous test lines, but can be made more rapidly.

#### Normal Construction

The term "Normal Construction" denotes all facilities the Telephone Company would normally use to provide service in the absence of a requirement for special construction.

#### Normal Cost

The term "Normal Cost" denotes the estimated cost to provide services using normal construction.

#### North American Numbering Plan

The term "North American Numbering Plan" denotes a three-digit area or Numbering Plan Area (NPA) code and a seven-digit telephone number made up of a three-digit Central Office code plus a four-digit station number.

#### Off-hook

The term "Off-hook" denotes the active condition of Switched Access on a Customer port which is connected to a Telephone Company Central Office.

### On-hook

The term "On-hook" denotes the idle condition of Switched Access on a Customer port which is connected to a Telephone Company Central Office.

### Open Circuit Test Line

The term "Open Circuit Test Line" denotes an arrangement in an end office which provides an ac open circuit termination of a trunk or line by means of an inductor of several Henries.

### **Originating Direction**

The term "Originating Direction" denotes the use of switched access service for the origination of calls from a Customer's premises to an IC premises.

## Other Network Provider

The term "Other Network Provider", or "ONP" refers to an entity that constructs or acquires its own switching, transmission, or other telecommunications facilities for the purpose of providing local and intrastate telecommunications services to themselves or others.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

#### Pay Telephone

The term "Pay Telephone" denotes instruments and related facilities that are available to the general public for public convenience and necessity, including public and semipublic telephones, and coinless telephones.

#### Permanent Facilities

The term "Permanent Facilities" denotes facilities providing service for one month or more.

<u>Phase Jitter</u> The term "Phase Jitter" denotes the unwanted phase variations of a signal.

### Point of Termination

The term "Point of Termination" denotes the point of demarcation within a customer-designated premises at which the Telephone Company's responsibility for the provision of access service ends. The point of demarcation is the point of interconnection between Telephone Company communications facilities and customer provided facilities as defined in Section 68.3 of the Federal Communications Commissions Rules and Regulations.

### Premises

The term "Premises" denotes a building or buildings on continuous property (except railroad right of way, etc.) not separated by a public highway.

### Primary Local Carrier

See "Local Carrier Customer"

### Recoverable Cost

The term "Recoverable Cost" denotes the cost of the specially constructed facilities for which the Telephone Company has a foreseeable reuse, either in place or elsewhere, should the service be terminated.

2.6 Definitions (Cont'd)

Reciprocal Compensation Arrangement

The term "Reciprocal Compensation Arrangement" denotes an arrangement between the Telephone Company and an Other Network Provider whose network is interconnected with the Telephone Company's network. Under a Reciprocal Compensation Arrangement, the Telephone Company receives compensation from the Other Network Provider for ONP traffic terminating on the Telephone Company's network. The Telephone Company pays compensation to the Other Network Provider for Telephone Company traffic terminating on the Other Network Provider's network. This type of arrangement applies only to intraLATA traffic.

Remote Switching Modules (RSM) and/or Remote Switching Systems (RSS) The term "Remote Switching Modules and/or Remote Switching Systems" denotes small, remotely controlled electronic end office switches which obtain their call processing capability from an ESS type Host Office. The RSM/RSS cannot accommodate direct trunks to a Customer.

2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### Return Loss

The term "Return Loss" denotes a measure of the similarity between the two impedances at the junction of two transmission paths. The higher the return loss, the higher the similarity.

### Registered Equipment

The term "Registered Equipment" denotes the Customer's premises equipment which complies with and has been approved within the Registration Provisions of Part 68 of the F.C.C.'s Rules and Regulations.

#### Serving Wire Center

The term "Serving Wire Center" denotes the wire center from which the customer designated premises would normally obtain dial tone from the Telephone Company.

### Seven Digit Manual Test Line

The term "Seven Digit Manual Test Line" denotes an arrangement which allows the Customer to select balance, milliwatt and synchronous test lines by manually dialing a seven digit number over the associated access connection.

### Shortage of Facilities or Equipment

The term "Shortage of Facilities or Equipment" denotes a condition which occurs when the Telephone Company does not have appropriate cable, switching capacity, bridging or, multiplexing equipment, etc., necessary to provide the Access Service requested by the customer.

#### Short Circuit Test Line

The term "Short Circuit Test Line" denotes an arrangement in an end office which provides for an ac short circuit termination of a trunk or line by means of a capacitor of at least four microfarads.

## Signal-to-C-Notched Noise Ratio

The term "Signal-to-C-Notched Noise Ratio" denotes the ratio in dB of a test signal to the corresponding C-Notched Noise.

## 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### Singing Return Loss (SRL)

The term "Singing Return Loss" denotes the frequency weighted measure of return loss at the edges of the voiceband (200 to 500 Hz and 2500 to 3200 Hz), where singing (instability) problems are most likely to occur.

## Special Access Circuit

The physical pathway for electromagnetic transmission of information between a dedicated originating point and a dedicated terminating point.

### Special Order

The term "Special Order" denotes an order for a Billing and Collection Service or an order for a Directory Assistance Service.

### Subtending End Office of an Access Tandem

The term "Subtending End Office of an Access Tandem" denotes an end office that has final trunk group routing through that tandem.

### Synchronous Test Line

The term "Synchronous Test Line" denotes an arrangement in an end office which performs marginal operational tests of supervisory and ring-tripping functions.

## **Telephone Company**

The term "Telephone Company" denotes the "FRONTIER TELEPHONE OF ROCHESTER INC." entity.

# 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

### **Terminating Direction**

The term "Terminating Direction" denotes the use of Switched Access Service for the completion of calls from an ONP's or an IC's premises to an end user customer's premises. "Terminating Direction" also denotes the use of Switched Access Service for the completion of calls from the Telephone Company to an ONP's end user customer's premises when the Telephone Company is compensating the ONP for such traffic under a Reciprocal Compensation Agreement.

### **Termination Charge**

The term "Termination Charge" denotes the portion of the Maximum Termination Liability that is applied as a nonrecurring charge when all services are discontinued prior to the expiration of the specified liability period.

### Transmission Measuring (105 Type) Test Line/Responder

The term "Transmission Measuring (105 Type) Test Line/Responder" denotes an arrangement in an end office which provides far-end access to a responder and permits two-way loss and noise measurements to be made on trunks from a near end office.

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### 2. <u>General Regulations</u> (Cont'd)

## 2.6 <u>Definitions</u> (Cont'd)

#### Transmission Path

The term "Transmission Path" denotes an electrical path capable of transmitting signals within the range of the service offering, e.g., a voice grade transmission path is capable of transmitting voice frequencies within the approximate range of 300 to 3000 Hz. A transmission path is comprised of physical or derived facilities consisting of any form or configuration of plant typically used in the telecommunications industry.

#### Trunk

The term "Trunk" denotes a communications path connecting two switching systems in a network, used in the establishment of an end-to-end connection.

#### Trunk Group

The term "Trunk Group" denotes a set of trunks which are traffic engineered as a unit for the establishment of connections between switching systems in which all of the communications paths are interchangeable.

#### **Trunk-Side Connection**

The term "Trunk-Side Connection" denotes the connection of a transmission path to the trunk side of a local exchange switching system.

#### Two-Wire to Four-Wire Conversion

The term "Two-Wire to Four-Wire Conversion" denotes an arrangement which converts a four-wire transmission path to a two-wire transmission path to allow a four-wire facility to terminate in a two-wire entity (e.g., central office switch).

#### Uniform Service Order Code (USOC)

The term "Uniform Service Order Code" denotes a three or five character alphabetic, numeric, or a alphanumeric code that identifies a specific item of service or equipment. Uniform Service Order Codes are used in the Telephone Company billing system to generate recurring rates and nonrecurring charges.

#### V and H Coordinates Method

The term "V and H Coordinates Method" denotes a method of computing airline miles between two points by utilizing an established formula which is based on the vertical (V) and horizontal (H) coordinates of the two points.

### WATS Serving Office

The term "WATS Serving Office" denotes a Telephone Company designated serving wire center where switching, screening and/or recording functions are performed in conjunction with the provision of special access services.

### Wire Center

The term "Wire Center" denotes a building in which one or more central offices, used for the provision of Telephone Exchange Services, are located.

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## 2. <u>General Regulations</u> (Cont'd)

### 2.7 <u>Surcharge for State Gross Income and Earnings Taxes</u>

A surcharge to recover the Gross Income Tax, and a portion of the Gross Earnings Tax, including the additional expense resulting from a change in the State Tax law, applies to all rates and charges for services in this tariff.

The applicable Gross Revenue Tax surcharge rates are shown on a statement attached to this tariff. Any changes to these rates will be filed on 15 days' notice to customers and the Commission, and as directed by the Commission. Whenever the state levies a new tax on the Company's gross revenues, repeals such a tax, or changes the rate of such tax, the Commission may approve new surcharge factors, and the Company will file revised surcharges as directed by the Commission.

- 2.8 <u>Schools and Libraries Discount Program</u>
  - (A) <u>General</u>

The Schools and Libraries Discount Program permits eligible schools (Public and Private, grades Kindergarten through 12) and libraries to purchase the Company services offered in this tariff and all intrastate tariffs except Frontier Telephone of Rochester, Inc. P.S.C. No. 1-Telephone at a discounted rate, in accordance with the Rules adopted by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in its Universal Service Order 97-157, issued May 8, 1997 and the New York State Public Service Commission in its Opinion and Order 97-11 Adopting Discounts for Services for Schools and Libraries, issued June 25, 1997. The Rules are codified at 47 Code of Federal Regulation (C.F.R.)54.500 et. seq.

As indicated in the Rules, the discounts will be between 20 and 90 percent of the pre-discount price, which is the price of services to schools and libraries prior to application of a discount. The level of discount will be based on an eligible school or library's level of economic disadvantage and by its location in either an urban or rural area. A school's level of economic disadvantage will be determined by the percentage of its students eligible for participation in the national school lunch program, and a library's level of economic disadvantage will be calculated on the basis of school lunch eligibility in the public school district in which the library is located. A non-public school may use either eligibility for the national school lunch program or other federally approved alternative measures to determine its level of economic disadvantage. To be eligible for the discount, schools and libraries will be required to comply with the terms and conditions set forth in the Rules. Discounts are available only to the extent that they are funded by the federal universal service fund. Schools and libraries may aggregate demand with other eligible entities to create a consortium.

- 2.8 <u>Schools and Libraries Discount Program (Cont'd)</u>
  - (B) <u>Regulations</u>
    - 1. Obligation of eligible schools and libraries
      - a) <u>Requests for service</u>
        - Schools and libraries and consortia shall participate in a competitive bidding process for all services eligible for discounts, in accordance with any state and local procurement rules.
        - 2) Schools and libraries and consortia shall submit requests for services to the Schools and Libraries Corporation, as designated by the FCC, and follow established procedures.
        - 3) Services requested will be used for educational purposes.
        - 4) Services will not be sold, resold or transferred in consideration for money or any other thing of value.

## 2. Obligations of the Company

- a) The Company will offer discounts to eligible schools and libraries on commercially available telecommunications services contained in this tariff. Those services contained in this tariff which are excluded from the discount program, in accordance with the Rules are included as an attachment to this tariff.
- b) The Company will offer services to eligible schools, libraries and consortia at prices no higher than the lowest price it charges to similarly situated non-residential customers for similar services (lowest corresponding price).
- c) In competitive bidding situations, the Company may offer flexible pricing or rates other than in this tariff, where specific flexible pricing arrangements are allowed, subject to New York State Public Service Commission approval.

### 2.8 <u>Schools and Libraries Discount Program (Cont'd)</u>

- C. Discounted Rates for Schools and Libraries
  - 1. Discounts for eligible schools and libraries and consortia shall be set as a percentage from the pre-discount price, which is the price of services to schools and libraries prior to application of a discount.
  - 2. The discount rate will be applied to eligible intrastate services purchased by eligible schools, libraries or consortia.
  - 3. The discount rate is based on each school's or library's level of economic disadvantage as determined in accordance with the FCC Order or other federally approved alternative measures (as permitted by the Rules) and by its location in either an urban or rural area.
  - 4. The discount matrix for eligible schools, libraries and consortia is included as an attachment to this tariff.
  - 5. The Company reserves the right to change the list of services excluded from the discount program, and to change the discount matrix at any time upon 1 days' notice to the Public Service Commission by providing a revised attachment to this tariff.

- 2.9 <u>Health Care Providers Support Program</u>
  - A. <u>General</u>

The purpose of the Health Care Providers Support Program is to enable public and non-profit rural health care providers to have access to telecommunications services necessary for the provision of health care services at rates comparable to those paid for similar services in urban areas. The Health Care Providers Support Program offers eligible public and non-profit health care providers located in rural areas reduced rates for Company intrastate services, available in this Tariff and all intrastate tariffs except Frontier Telephone of Rochester, Inc. PSC No. 1-Telephone. Such services must be purchased in accordance with the Rules adopted by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in its Universal Service Order 97-157, issued May 8, 1997 and the New York State Public Service Commission in its Order in Cases 94-C-0095 and 28425, issued November 4, 1997. The FCC Rules are codified at 47 Code of Federal Regulation (C.F.R.) 54.601 et. seq., and any amendments made thereto.

- B. <u>Regulations</u>
  - 1. To be eligible for the reduced rates, rural health care providers are required to comply with the terms and conditions set forth in the FCC Rules.
  - 2. Reduced rates are available only to the extent that they are funded by the federal universal service fund.
  - 3. Eligible rural health care providers may aggregate demand with other entities to create a consortium. Universal service support shall apply only to the portion of eligible services used by an eligible health care provider.

- 2.9 <u>Health Care Providers Support Program</u> (Cont'd)
  - B. <u>Regulations (Cont'd)</u>
    - 4. Responsibility of eligible health care providers
      - a) Rural health care providers and consortia shall participate in a competitive bidding process for all services eligible for reduced rates in accordance with any state and local procurement rules.
      - b) Rural health care providers and consortia shall submit requests for services to the program Administrator, as designated by the FCC, and follow established procedures.
      - c) Services requested must be used for purposes related to the provision of health care services or instruction that the health care provider is legally authorized to provide under the law.
      - d) A health care provider that cannot obtain toll free access to an Internet service provider and who is eligible for support for limited toll-free access under the Rules must certify that it lacks toll-free Internet access and that it is an eligible health care provider.
      - e) Services cannot be sold, resold or transferred in consideration for money or any other thing of value.
    - 5. Responsibility of the Company
      - a) The Company shall offer the rates and charges as specified in Section C, to eligible health care providers to the extent that facilities and services are available and offered in the tariffs specified in A. preceding.
      - b) The Company shall offer services to eligible rural health care providers and consortia at prices no higher than the highest urban rate as defined in the FCC Order and Rules.
      - c) In competitive bidding situations, where specific flexible pricing arrangements are allowed, the Company may offer flexible pricing (to determine the reduced rate) subject to New York State Public Service Commission approval.

## 2.9 <u>Health Care Providers Support Program</u> (Cont'd)

### C. Rates and Charges

The following price adjustments will be available to eligible rural health care providers, except subparagraph 3., which shall be available to all eligible health care providers, regardless of location:

- 1. A reduced rate for telecommunications services, using a bandwidth capacity of up to 1.544 Mbps, not to exceed the highest tariffed or publicly available rate charged to a commercial customer for a similar service provided over the same distance in the nearest city in New York State with a population of at least 50,000.
- 2. An exemption from some mileage charges for any telecommunications services, using a bandwidth capacity of up to 1.544 Mbps, that is necessary for the provision of health care services. The exempted mileage includes the distance between the rural health care provider and the most distant perimeter of the nearest city in New York State with a population of 50,000 or more, less the standard urban distance, which is the maximum average diameter of all cities with population of 50,000 or more in the state.
- 3. Each eligible health care provider that cannot obtain toll-free access to an Internet service provider is entitled to receive toll charge credits for toll charges imposed for connecting to an Internet service provider as per the FCC Rules. Such toll charge credits are available pursuant to applicable toll tariffs.

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
